WHAT THE OLD RANGER SAW ONE JULY DAY

One July day the Old Camp Ranger sat by Apache Wells. You know, the place down hill from Arapaho near the old Dinkey Creek Road. It was a nicely warm sunny morning and the ranger sat on the rock where a pool formed now that the water level in the creek was lower.

At first the ranger noticed the **mosquito larva** flexing and straightening as they rose to the surface of the water for air.

On the bottom of the pool, there seemed to be a lot of 1 inch long sticks. But then she noticed these sticks moved! On closer look she saw that the front end of the stick had a head and 6 small legs. The stick part was made of short (1/4 inch) pieces of pine needles and tiny bits of shiny rock, **mica**. These were actually insect larvae for the **caddis fly**. Somehow the caddis fly larvae wrapped the pine needles and stone bits into a tube for its hind end to live in.

After a pleasant sit by the pool, the old ranger got up slowly. She noticed another kind of insect walking, skating almost, on top of the water. These clever insects are water striders.

Since it was time to return

to work, she walked up the trail amid lots of white fragrant **azaleas**, pink **spirea**, blue **lupine** and a few orange sierra lilies.

The old Ranger hopes you will walk down the trail near the Arapaho biffy and on down to the Creek. Maybe you can see these things. Or maybe new plants and animals will be enjoying Dinkey Creek the day you go.
